

Her humility

And Mary said, "Behold the bondslave of the Lord..." (Luke 1:38) Mary accepted her situation and was submissive to God. How many lessons can we learn from that? Do we resist and kick up a fuss when things are difficult or puzzling to us? Do we blow up when things don't go the way we had planned, especially when we feel we are not at fault? We can learn much from Mary's gentle and quiet spirit, not to mention her faith in God's plan and care for her.



Her obedience

This goes along with her submission and humble spirit. Mary was obedient to God and His holy will. In the modern world, we often believe that everything is up to us, and we use God only as a backup plan. Mary let God control her life without taking credit for her own part of God's plan. If we allow God to control our lives and to lead us, we will develop greater spirituality. We will obtain joy in our hearts. Obedience is not the same as being spineless or unthinking. Many times in Jesus' life, as Mary observed Him, she "pondered these things in her heart." (Luke 2:19) But she was obedient and retained the close ties to God through her prayers and obedience.
